- Remedial course in English is conducted for students who are weak in English (English Department).
- In English medium classes - if students find difficulty in understanding the content, the teachers take special efforts to simplify difficult terminology in regional language

## **2.3 Teaching – Learning Process**

### **2.3.1 How does the institution plan and organize the teaching- learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc)**

Ans. The Academic Council monitors teaching- learning and evaluation schedules of the institution. To facilitate this function the Council prepares -

**Academic calendar** – In the beginning of every academic year, the calendar is prepared wherein the following days are mentioned-

- teaching days
- examination schedule
- sports day
- annual day
- seminars and workshops
- public holidays

To keep teachers abreast of the schedule, the calendar is displayed on the notice board every month. Academic calendar is also displayed on the website.

**Teaching Plan** – Every teacher prepares study plan in the beginning of the academic year. A copy is submitted to the Academic council.

**Departmental calendar**-Departments plan departmental activities at the beginning of the academic year and a copy of this is submitted to the Academic Council. At the end of the academic year, a review meeting is called to assess the implementation. An assessment form is also filled by the departments.

**Examination Committee**- It plans out the examination schedule for every academic year. Evaluation blueprint specified in the University syllabus is conveyed to the students at the beginning of the academic year and before each examination schedule.

Ans. Some departments have departmental library for the use of faculty and students. The books and journals maintained by the departmental library are donated by the faculty members and ex-students. The department manages the lending/borrowing of books to the students or teachers. The students are benefited as they get easy access and topic specific detailed personal guidance. Also, the reference books at the departmental libraries are issued for home lending.

**2.3.7 Has the institution introduced evaluation of the teachers by students? If yes, how is the feedback analyzed and implemented for the improvement of teaching?**

Ans. Evaluation of teachers by students through Teacher Assessment Questionnaire (TAQ) is monitored by IQAC. The data collected through TAQ is then analyzed with the help of a statistician and the results are conveyed to the teacher concerned. The identity of the student is not revealed to the teachers. This ensures unbiased responses. In case the feedback is not satisfactory, the Principal personally discusses with the

teacher. Teachers in some subjects also take personal feedback from students and take necessary action.

## 2.4 Teacher Quality

Ans. The teachers are selected according to the UGC guidelines, State government and the University. Posts are advertised in the national and local newspapers. After short listing, eligible candidates are interviewed by the Selection Committee which consists of Vice-Chancellor's nominee, subject experts, Joint Director's nominee, Management representatives, HODs and Principal. The recommendation of the Selection Committee is forwarded to the University for approval.

The college has the requisite number of qualified and competent teachers to handle all courses. In Professional and Post Graduate programmes, the college invites visiting faculty to support the existing staff. At the UG level too, subject experts are invited to enhance students' knowledge.

Ans. The college has introduced self financed U.G Professional and PG courses in the last five years. The University norms are followed in the appointment of faculty in these courses. It has appointed three full time lecturers in B.M.S. and one full time lecturer in B.CA respectively and a total of 16 lecturers have been appointed as visiting faculty.

- The Health centre has a lady doctor on call.
- Regular tests on Thalessemia and Anaemia are conducted for students
- Bone density test, cancer detection, dental checkup and health checkup at minimum cost is conducted for the faculty.
- Camps for dental checkup, Eye and ENT checkup are organized for students and faculty.
- Talks on various health related topics are arranged.

Health centre is a very active unit. This year, a proposal for a research survey on “Iron Deficiency” is submitted to Indian Merchants’ Chamber (IMC), Ladies Wing, for financial assistance.

Ans. The institution caters only to women students, so all the collegiate and inter collegiate, sports and cultural activities are for women students alone.

- Remedial and bridge courses are provided to academically weak students.
- Book borrowing facilities from the teachers, departmental libraries and the book bank.
- Flexibility of timing is given for working students in special cases
- Special coaching provided to academically weak students

Ans. Welfare schemes provided by institution for students are as follows:

**STUDENTS’ INSURANCE SCHEME**

- Students pay Rs. 10/- per year for students’ insurance and are insured for upto one lakh under the Students’ Safety Policy (Risk is covered for journey from home to college and back and field trips/study tour conducted by the college). Till now three claims have been settled.

**HEALTH CENTRE**

- The health centre “Arogyam” takes care of students’ health by arranging for medical check ups (anemia, Thalessemia, dental check up, eye check up etc.)
- First aid is available on the premises
- Doctor on call is available and the expenses for the same are borne by the college

**FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE**

- The economically disadvantaged students are provided with financial assistance and facility to pay fees on installment basis.

**EARN WHILE YOU LEARN**

- Placement cell working with the objective of “Earn while you learn” seeks to arrange employment for the students enrolled with the cell. .

**BOOK BANK FACILITIES**

- Book Bank provides books to the students on payment of a nominal deposit. The students are allowed to keep the books throughout the year.

**INTERNET FACILITY**

- Students are provided with free internet facility

## **CANTEEN FACILITIES**

- Students are provided with canteen facilities within the premises.
- Health food is served in the canteen.

## **FLEXIBLE TIMING**

Flexible timing is given to the students to encourage them to continue studies. This facility is particularly available to-

- Working students
- Lactating student mothers
- Married students
- Students who face family problems

Ans. Placement cell was formally started in 2005-06 and it works with the objective “Earn while you learn” for regular students and it also provides full time placements. Placement cell works for the regular students and for alumni. The total number of applications, requesting for placements received in 2007-08 were 252, out of which 132 students were placed.

Activities conducted by the cell can be briefly summarized as follows:

- Campus interviews (organisations like Wipro, TCS, Raj Software etc. )
- Lectures on-Career opportunities in event management and career planning
- Placement mela for the students
- Counseling programmes were arranged for the students.
- The Placement Cell also encourages students to go for self employment.

## **Counseling Services**

### **FAMILY COUNSELING CENTRE**

With the support of Ministry Of Social Welfare Board, Family Counseling Centre has been set up to provide free professional help to students in the areas of- academic and career related problems, family crisis, behavioural problems and



personal problems. It also provides pre-marital counseling and marital counseling. The services of the centre are also open to the community.

Counseling facility is also provided in the college at two levels-

- Teacher provides counseling to students when ever required.
- Departments like Psychology, BMS, English and Gujarati provide mentoring services to their students.

### **5.2.6 How does the institution encourage and develop entrepreneurial skills among the students?**

Ans. The institution promotes entrepreneurial skill through-

- Career oriented programmes funded by UGC, introduced by the institution (entrepreneurship, fashion designing, interior designing and travel & tourism) which enables the student to venture out in future as an entrepreneur.
- Seminars like a two-day UGC sponsored national seminar on “Entrepreneurship” was organized by the department of Commerce in January 2007. Four day pre-seminar workshops were organized in December 2006, where many entrepreneurs were invited to give first hand information about developing entrepreneur skills.

- The committee consists of the following representatives - Students, Staff, Students' Council conveners and canteen personnel. They are entrusted with the responsibility of deciding the rates of the eatables
- The daily menu is decided in collaboration with Health cell
- Checking the hygiene of the canteen.

### 4) STUDENTS' VOICE COMMITTEE

Students' Voice looks into the redressal of collective grievances by organizing face to face dialogue between students and frontline staff. The cell arranges for face to face interaction of the aggrieved parties.

### **5.3.6 Does the institution have a mechanism to seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and from employers, to improve the growth and development of the institution?**

Ans. Yes, the institute collects the feedback from its students about its growth and development. As a result of feedback, the following changes have been incorporated-

- Drinking water facility was separated from toilet facilities for students
- Provision of Water cooler to students
- Due to negative feedback about the canteen, menu was improved
- Due to students' demand courses like Retail Operation and Tally have been started.

- Activities through NSS, Janseva NGO, and para professional certificate course to make them aware of their commitment towards society.
- NCC training provides additional focus on cycling, mountaineering, river-rafting, rappelling etc
- Arogyam, the health care centre looks into the health requirements of the students.

Ans. The management's commitment and involvement is reflected through the following:-

- Provision of infrastructural facilities and equipments wherever necessary.

(The office staff and teaching staff are encouraged to take up higher studies, research projects, TQM measures like Kaizen, 5-S and Quality circles)

- **The staff is encouraged to take up multidimensional roles**

(Besides the conventional roles the staff is motivated to take up multiple roles as leaders in different areas of institutional development like health, extension work and overall development of students)

- **Transparency encouraged at all levels**

(Decisions are taken in consultation with key functionaries- Principal, Supervisors, Heads of Departments, Registrar, and Librarian.)

- **Partnership roles are emphasized**

(Constructive suggestions are encouraged from all levels irrespective of hierarchy)

Ans. The decentralization of the organization helps in redressing all the grievances of the employees. The decentralized policy exercised by the Head of the institute encourages transparency and quick redressal of grievances (if any). Faculty representation at the LMC meeting also enables the staff to voice its grievances. Usually the grievances are resolved at college level i.e. between the Principal and the aggrieved.

Ans. The management meets the staff twice a year. The major issues discussed during the last meeting are as under:-

- Welfare schemes for teachers and students

Ans. Members of all departments and support services prepare the future plan on the basis of the need analysis and a series of discussions with members, student representatives' feedback and other stakeholders. This is then presented by the Principal in the LMC meeting. After approval by the LMC, the IQAC prepares the final plan and the same monitors the execution of the plan.

Ans. The objectives of the proposed plan are displayed on the notice board at various places such as students' notice board, corridor, office etc for the information of the staff and students, besides communicating to the members during meeting of various committees. The vision and mission statements are also given in the college magazine.

- New Computer laboratory with 80 computers

Ans. To promote co-operation, sharing of knowledge, innovations and empowerment of the faculty, the following steps have been taken-

The staff study circle has been set up to promote a feeling of camaraderie in the institution. Certain activities organized by the staff study circle are-

- Talks by faculty on common areas of interest
- Inviting experts from various fields viz, stress-management, voice modulation, RTI etc.
- Sharing of skills like computer knowledge, communication skills, etc. amongst teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Inter-disciplinary seminars wherein teachers share their knowledge and skills with students from other departments and faculty. Fostering harmony by promoting programmes like :-

- Plays enacted, written and directed by teachers.
- Sports meet for teaching and non-teaching
- Dinner organised by Management for teaching staff

- Organising get-together through picnics and celebrating festivals
- Innovative ways of bidding farewell.

The non-teaching staff -

- Organizes Tarang – an intercollegiate competition by non-teaching for the staff of SNTD and Mumbai University.
- TQM groups work together to bring constructive changes in the present working style
- Share skills and build confidence amongst staff members during project presentations



## 6.4 Human Resource Management

- Assessment of the Principal, Registrar, Staff and Librarian by the non-teaching staff.

The feedback results in discussions between the Principal, Faculty and Staff to review the feedback and take necessary steps to improve on them. For non-teaching staff, the Registrar and the Principal follow the same procedure.

**6.4.2 What are the welfare measures for the staff and faculty? (Mention only those which affect and improve staff well-being, satisfaction and motivation)**

Ans. Welfare measures for staff and faculty:

- Medical checkup at a nominal charge
- Assured payment of salary by the management even if delayed by the government
- Financial assistance and help for Class IV employees as required.
- Group insurance scheme for staff

Ans. Staff recruitment takes place as per Government and UGC norms.

To retain faculty and staff

- The institution strives to create amicable environment
- Provide staff welfare schemes
- Encourage teachers for upgrading their knowledge through research and faculty development programmes.

Ans. Part time faculty is recruited by the Selection Committee and the subject experts nominated by the University and they are paid according to UGC norms. They are recruited according to the workload requirements of the department. Visiting faculty for B.M.S., B.C.A. and PG are recruited through interviews and paid an honorarium on hourly basis.

**6.4.5 What are the policies, resources and practices of the institution that support and ensure the professional development of the faculty ? (Eg. Budget allocation for staff development, sponsoring for advanced study, research, participation in seminars, conferences, workshops, etc. and supporting membership and active involvement in local, state, national and international professional associations) ?**

Ans. The money allocated by the UGC for Participation of Teachers in Academic Conference (PTAC) is distributed equally among teachers who attend seminars, conferences, workshops etc. during the academic year. The institution takes institutional membership from libraries such as BCL and American Centre for Studies which can also be used by individual faculty member.

**6.4.6 How do you assess the needs of the faculty development? Has the institution conducted any staff development programmes for skill up-gradation and training of the staff? If yes, give details.**

Ans. The needs of the faculty are known through feedback, recommendations of LIC, NAAC and such governing bodies. Activities undertaken in the areas of skill up-gradation and training of the staff are -

- Training is provided in Quality Enhancement Techniques to teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Two workshops were arranged for the faculty in collaboration with NCQM (National Centre for Quality Management)
- Staff study circle organizes talks, seminars and orientations under Faculty Development Programme

- Computer training for teaching staff.
- Two state level workshops in collaboration with UGC were arranged for the non-teaching staff
- MS-CIT training at a concessional rate was provided to the non-teaching staff
- Communication skills classes were also provided for them.
- Interested Class IV employees are encouraged to take up training in book binding and gardening and are given job work for income augmentation.
- As an outcome of the training in quality enhancement techniques, projects are undertaken by the faculty and non-teaching staff to standardize activities aimed towards improving the functioning of the college processes.

Ans. The facilities provided to the staff are –

- Availability of computer along with internet facilities for teaching staff.
